

Direct Care RNs with Specialty Certifications in Acute Care Hospitals

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PURPOSE

The nursing profession's efforts to improve healthcare quality have resulted in rapid growth in the number of specialty certifications and certified nurses. Our purpose is to provide a current description of direct care RNs with specialty certifications in acute care hospitals in the United States:

Specialty certifications held

METHODS

Cross-sectional descriptive design using data from the webbased 2009 NDNQI RN Survey.

RN inclusion criteria:

Full or part-time, regardless of job title

> 50% of time in direct patient care

Employed >3 months on unit or workgroup

MEASURES AND SAMPLE

RNs in 770 U.S. hospitals responding to survey: 270,423 (65% Response Rate)



CONCLUSIONS and IMPLICATIONS

Certified RNs have more years of experience than noncertified RNs, are more likely to work in Magnet recognized hospitals, and in academic medical centers. Research is needed to explore the impact of certified RNs.
