# **Strategies to Increase Certification**

#### Certification Exam Review and Testing

- CPN written exam hosted on-site 3x/year
- Review courses and specialty study groups held at hospital

#### Expense Reimbursement

Organization pays for certification/re-certification costs

## Pediatric Nursing Certification Board (PNCB) exams

- Institutional Competency Assessment Plan (ICAP™) implemented for online registration
- Organization is billed directly & not charged for failed exams

#### Compensation


Certification pay awarded as increase to base pay

## Recognition

- Eligibility for higher levels of Career Advancement Program
- Nurses Week Certification Pins awarded during Certification Luncheon hosted by Chief Nursing Officer
- Recognition on certification plaques, in Nursing Annual Report and denoted on employee badge

#### Results

CMH&C has experienced remarkably high certification rates, including recognition as the first organization with over 500 PNCB certified nurses. Over 65% of our direct care nurses are certified, significantly exceeding other Magnet Designated Organizations (American Nurses Credentialing Center, 2010).



## **Implications for Practice**

Certification substantiates patients, families and health care colleagues' confidence in the nurse's expertise. By supporting nurses in obtaining certification through financial and physical resources, organizations are able to deliver exemplary nursing care and further enhance patient outcomes.
